Weed & Seed: Growing a Healthier Community

Not all the development in Allentown is taking place downtown. Behind the scenes in the 1st and 6th Wards, there is a lot going on with the Weed & Seed initiative. Started in 2002, this Department of Justice program involves long-term strategic planning with a mission to "unite the community, promoting an atmosphere of trust and civility where quiet, drug-free streets sustain thriving businesses that encourage community action and revitalization."

To "weed out" crime, local and state police provide a more visible presence in the target neighborhood, which extends from Front to 8th streets and from Tilghman to Hamilton streets. Local Weed & Seed Coordinator, Phyllis Alexander, says having police on foot patrols encourages better relations with law enforcement while also promoting public safety.

The "seeding" is a collaborative and comprehensive approach involving social service providers and community leaders who form the Assistance for Impact Delegation Team or AID Team. The AID Team provides leadership and serves as a resource to residents.

There is also a Target Area Local Leadership (TALL) Team of individuals who live, work or volunteer in the neighborhood. These are the people who know the community best and can share insights about its needs and assets. Residents on the TALL Team are provided with leadership training to enhance their problem-solving and leadership skills.

Both teams work together and with other public and private entities on subcommittees to

identify the community's problems and work together to solve them through varied programs.

At Grace Episcopal Church, at 5th and Allen streets, Kensy Dubon provides residents with employment counseling. Her role is to assist and coach individuals in the skills needed to obtain a job.

Deserie Harper of the Adult Literacy Center of the Lehigh Valley works with residents (17-21 years old) in the Youth Education Adult Program (YAEP). YAEP provides GED preparation classes as well as a life skills program for young adults looking for a better quality of life.

To further economic revitalization, Community Action Development Corporation's Dan Bosket works with the small business community, providing information

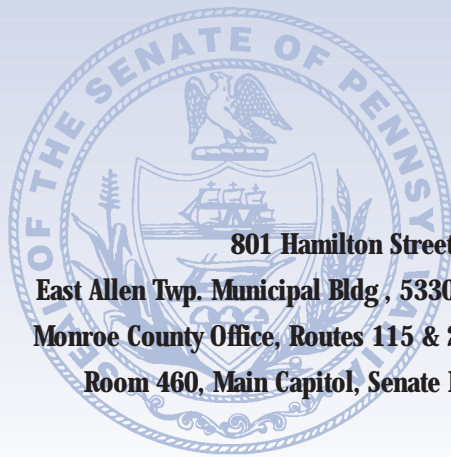
